45–30 Days Before Move:

- Book movers or reserve moving truck
- Order packing supplies
- Start packing non-essential items
- Notify employer and schools of move date

30–15 Days Before Move:

- Schedule utility transfers and internet installation
- Change address with banks, subscriptions, and service providers
- Confirm moving logistics and access at both properties
- Prepare important documents in one secure location

Final 14 Days:

- Pack daily-use items last
- Confirm closing and move-in dates
- Arrange childcare or pet care for moving day
- Prepare basic supplies for first night in new home

Before You Start:

- Confirm work locations and acceptable commute times
- List must-have lifestyle features
- Consult a lender and finalize budget
- Decide between HOA and non-HOA communities

During Home Tours:

- Ask about average utility costs
- Review HOA rules and restrictions
- Observe traffic, noise, and access

Northern Colorado communities are closely connected by major highways, making it possible to live in one town and work or spend time in another. Understanding how these areas relate geographically can help you choose a home that fits both your lifestyle and your daily commute.

Use this page to visualize how the communities connect:

- Fort Collins sits at the north end of the main I-25 corridor and is the largest population center in the region.
- Loveland is directly south of Fort Collins and serves as a central hub for medical and industrial employment.
- Windsor is east of both Fort Collins and Loveland, offering easy access to multiple cities and newer subdivisions.
- Timnath sits just east of Fort Collins and is one of the fastest-growing residential areas.
- Berthoud is south of Loveland with convenient access to Longmont and Boulder County.
- Foothills communities run west of Fort Collins and Loveland, providing mountain access with longer drive times.

Typical commute patterns to consider:

- I-25 is the primary north–south corridor connecting all major towns.
- East–west travel often involves county roads and may take longer during peak hours.
- Foothills routes can be slower in winter weather and during fire season closures.
- Denver International Airport is generally 60–90 minutes away depending on traffic and starting point.
